What is most important to you when designing your interiors? I love the use of color, and I'm a big proponent of using a lot of texture, whether it's in textiles or woods—texture catches light differently and it's what gives a room interest. I also find importance in the tactile quality of things and how they make you feel. There's so much subliminal psychology behind design—from asking yourself, "Why do I feel good in a room?" to "Does the seating work?" There's no right way to do something—I hope to encourage readers to stand back and look at their homes and make them uniquely theirs.

One of our favorite houses is Enchanted Oaks in Monterey. How would you describe it? It's a Spanish hacienda-style home set on a gradual sloping hillside and covered with beautiful, sculptural California oaks. My clients didn't want a grand villa or a farmhouse, so this is kind of in between. There's a play on textures with antique doors from Spain, terra-cotta floors, distressed beams and soft, inviting fabrics. I love the library—we paneled it all in oak, bleached it and gave it a cerused effect. It has a wonderful indoor-outdoor feeling and is very cozy.

What are your biggest influences? I'm always inspired by my travels, whether it's Italy, Morocco or England. I think it's important to take pictures and create digital files of your inspirations—if I lost my camera and someone looked at it, they would see everything from doorknobs and tree barks to floorboards, gates, gardens and ceilings! ■
